Dear Parents/Carers,

The team won the *Thinking Outside The Box* trophy, and will continue their resilience project in the months to come.

Supporting Parent Relationships with Separating better app

Separating parents living on the Isle of Wight are among the first in the country to have access to a new app designed to help them self-manage their separation.

Separating better has been created by the UK's leading relationship research and innovation charity OnePlusOne, with funding from the Department for Works and Pensions. It features tools to help with many practical elements of separation such as budgeting and legal arrangements. It also offers parents a template to create their own parenting plans to help them agree how to co-parent their children effectively.

An in-app quiz helps parents to understand where they are emotionally in their separation journey and a series of *Work it out* videos help parents learn communication skills which they can use to co-parent effectively and keep their children's best interests at the heart of their decision-making.

# **Resilience challenge Competition**



On Tuesday 23rd January a team of 6 students from Years 9, 10 and 12 represented the school in a resilience challenge.

They were given a scenario for the island and had to come up with a response that would allow us to survive and be able to operate as normally as possible.

On this occasion, they were told that a bomb had been found in central Newport. while they were planning the response they were told the bomb had detonated. They spent the day talking to those in the council to get the right information and preparing a presentation for a panel of people from the council, Southern Water, the Police, NHS and others.

We returned on Wednesday to do the presentation and take part in some sustainable STEM activities.

Great fun was had, designing self-propelling gyroscopes for travel to school and sustainable restaurants while the other teams were doing their presentations.

As we prepared to present the nerves kicked in and all the students were on edge and getting excited to get their point across. They returned from the presentation room with big smiles and a very good feeling about how they did.

We then had to wait, it was a very tense time, however, the results were good and we took home the 'Thinking Outside of the Box' award.

This was especially welcome when you compared our mixed team to the other schools, which sent teams made entirely of final-year students.

Judges were very impressed with the research and analysis of complex data throughout the

first day. Most notably, Annabelle Acutt managed to endure and respond effectively to complicated questions about substations! Olivia Jones became an effective leader and communicated well with her team, making sure everyone was on track and had a job to do. What was best was how the team worked well together - even forming a group and finishing their presentation in the evening!

#### **Inspirational Speaker**

As a community, we were honoured, and privileged, to welcome Commander Scotty Mills back into our College earlier this week. Scotty was born and raised in south London, joining the Royal Marines in his teens. He went on to serve 32 years as an Officer in the Royal Marines, becoming the highest-ranking commissioned black officer in Marines history. Scotty has earned a reputation as an inspirational leader and team builder, and he has worked with the England rugby World Cup-winning squad of 2003, the GB women's Olympic hockey team and Gareth Southgate's England football squad. Most recently he has been working with the Lionesses (2018-2023).

Scotty has previously worked with staff at Christ the King, who were so inspired by him that we very much wanted him back to talk to our students. On this occasion, all students in years 10-13 had the amazing opportunity to listen to Scotty's inspirational story, and to consider how Royal Marines' values can be transferred into our own lives and mindsets. Our students were an absolute credit, listening with maturity and considering how our College values, and their own personal values and aspirations, can help them reach their targets and be a better person every day.

Here are just a few of our students' comments on the experience:

I found Scotty's visit very helpful and motivating. He shared his story about how when he was young people, told him that he wouldn't amount to anything but he proved them all wrong and showed us that anything is possible if you put your mind to it!

Very engaging. Talked to us like we actually mattered, and we felt respected. He wasn't condescending.

He was really inspirational.

Scotty was really inspirational and engaging, especially for a sixth former looking to join the military - Scotty is an example of how anyone can achieve their impossible dreams from breaking a world record to bringing multiple world famous teams to success.

I found it to be very engaging and motivating. Scotty is a prime example of hard work and dedication pays off in life. I will look to put these skills into my own life.

I found the session particularly useful as I had been struggling with motivation for a while and it showed me how to positively approach and tackle problems. I especially liked his story about his journey to become a marine and how it showed how perseverance is an essential skill to put into practice daily.

I like the way Scotty engaged us with loads of questions and giving us advice that is really useful to us. I really enjoyed how he talked to us about how nothing is impossible if we put our mind to it.

It was an inspiration and I really want to purchase his book as he posed a good role model to our community.

He was very real and made everything he said motivate us - very interesting man with amazing accomplishments.

Scotty had a very unique and interesting story that could inspire people to work hard and fight easy. His words starts to prepare people for anything if they choose to take his words and achieve more than they thought was possible.
