AN HISTORIC SERVICE

Christ the King College marked history with having three female priests leading the Anglican Easter Holy Communion Services on Wednesday 27th March 2024. It marks thirty years since the first female priests were ordained in the Church of England in 1994. Another first for Christ the King College was to run four Holy Communion and mass services simultaneously for the whole College community. This meant that 150 Catholic pupils and staff were in St. Mary's (CoE) Church, Carisbrooke for a catholic Mass led by Father Stephen Vooght with Revd Steve Sutcliffe supporting.

Our College Community, students and staff ended the term with the opportunity to receive communion or a blessing. The services were greatly enhanced by three student led worship bands and students leading the prayers at all of the services.

Year 11 and the 6th form had the privilege of hearing from Revd Canon Sarah Chapman who was ordained in May 1994. Revd Sarah wore the stole that she wore when priested 30 years ago and talked about the historic moment that all of the school was part of that day. Her presence inspired all of the students to aim high regardless of any actual or perceived barriers. All listened attentively and were fascinated by Revd Sarah's sharing her own journey.

340 students from Years 9 and 10 were led by Revd Emma Cooksey who works with and supports Christ the King College on a regular basis. The Chaplains presented Revd Emma with flowers and a card to thank her for her continued support in growing the Chaplaincy at Christ the King College. Revd Emma was ordained in 2018 in the Diocese of Lichfield by Bishop Michael Ipgrave. Most recently Rev Emma has worked with students in making creative Lent reflections for all of the students to benefit from within the Christ the King College Chapel.

Rev Leisa Potter from the West Wight Mission Community led the service for 375 Year 7 and 8 students. Rev Leisa holds a place in Church of England history in that she was the first priest in the Church of England to be ordained by the first female Bishop, the Rt Revd and Rt Hon Dame Sarah Mullally.

The students heard the story of Jesus and his disciples at 'The Last Supper', considering the importance of tables in all of our lives. From playing games such as table football, table ice hockey to eating around tables and chatting the students were also encouraged to see on tables as places for discussion, reconciliation and for choosing to include rather than exclude others.

And today, students and staff are demonstrating their faith in action in two ways. Firstly students are paying a pound to come in mufti in aid of Hampshire and Isle of Wight Air Ambulance and secondly the Year 12 CAFOD Young Leaders are holding a bake sale to support humanitarian aid in Gaza.



Enrichment Roundup

The Enrichment programme continues to deliver some truly unique opportunities, starting last month with the **Ayres Punchard Impact Investment Trip** which saw 4 of our students travel to London to deliver their findings to those who support the investment of 'sustainable' Funds with holdings in excess of £725 Million. After an extremely high-level chat (in the building's own private cinema, no less) we were whisked over to the UK offices of CityWire magazine for interviews and professional photography in their studio. The experience was incredible and absolutely unique—you won't find anyone, anywhere getting the kind of access we enjoyed.

Anyone interested in enhancing their post-16 Oracy skills should consider taking part in the **Isle of Wight Schools Debating Competition** on June 14th. We already have enough participants for at least 1 team, but that should not stop you signing up or getting involved in other ways. The event runs all day, with the teams formally debating in the afternoon, so the whole morning will be given over to public speaking, carousel-style activities and key note speakers (TBC, but the organisers are hoping to get our local MP or similar person whose command of the spoken word is something worth passing onto participants).

Looking Ahead

The remainder of the year is increasingly busy, with speakers coming in from Gap Year / Volunteering specialists, the Mountbatten Hospice to discuss the challenging but unavoidable topic of Death and Dying and local politicians on how power is distributed and used in the UK, and our part in it. We will also have in-house events coordinated around themes from the post-16 curriculum, including RE and PSHE, to look forward towards the end of the year, too.

Unifrog Integration

Enrichment at Christ the King College offers students a range of opportunities, perspectives and experiences, both in which to take part and speakers' own to reflect upon. In order to make this even more impactful, all Enrichment activates (both timetabled sessions and anything students participate in through the programme) will be linked to Unifrog via 'Interactions'. What this means in practical terms is everyone who attends an Enrichment session will have it linked to their Unifrog account, with the associated skills and write-up from me included. This will make evidencing your experiences of what we have to offer in your future applications much more easier.

Bob Seeley Visit

Government & Politics students enjoyed hosting local MP Bob Seeley this term. They had the opportunity to canvass their local MP on issues that are important to them, these included: Advances in AI technology, Sewerage in our seas, Education and opportunities on the Isle of Wight, housing and the environment, Transgender healthcare, the ferries, the Government's Rwanda Policy, Anti-Semitism, conflict abroad and the division of the Isle of Wight constituency into two halves.

The conversations were robust and our pupils did not shy away from sensitive and controversial topics. We are extremely proud of their contributions and conduct at the event.

This is aimed at students considering applying to the University of Southampton to study degrees in Physics, Mathematics or Electronics and Computer Science.



We are looking to **employ students in Year 9-13 to** work with us to redesign and develop our Learn with US programme. This programme is an extension of a successful pilot project that ran last term, where six Year 10 students worked with us to design our Year 10 residential.

These students must be willing to discuss and share their ideas in a group setting, complete independent work and feed back in a weekly meeting, and discuss the activities with their school peers to gain a wide student experience. If you know any students who you think would engage fully in this programme who also meet our widening participation criteria, please do encourage them to apply. We want to ensure that our programmes meet the needs and wants of the students they are targeted towards, and we feel there is no better way than involving them in the process. This programme will give students a first-hand taste of the workplace and give them a valuable experience to talk about in any future applications.

So how will this work? **Students will be employed for a maximum of 12 weeks**, **starting in the summer half term (w/c 27th May) of 2024**. They will attend three in person sessions during half term, with the opportunity to remain on campus for study sessions afterwards, attend a weekly virtual meeting, held after school, for 5 weeks, and be set tasks to complete that will take two hours a week. We will also hold a final in person session after the programme to thank the students for taking part. All travel expenses will be covered, and food will be provided during any in person sessions.

Students who meet our usual widening participation criteria – which can be found on the job description – can apply for this programme. We particularly encourage you to speak to students who may not be involved with similar activities already but may be interested in sharing their thoughts. We ask that teachers provide a reference for any student who wants to apply and will contact you once we have received an application. THE PROJECT

When a Gen Z playwright learns about the life of 1920's rebellious force, Joe Carstairs, they can't help but notice parallels in their own identity. A highly-charged fusion of movement, words, and music that brings one of the 20th century's boldest queer figures into sharp relief.

This play confronts cis-heteronormativity head-on, delving into the intersections of gender, sexuality, and class. Carstairs looks at the complexities of being socialised as a woman and how genderqueerness can call into question your relationship to womanhood, lesbianism, and society as a whole.

This is a PAID opportunity for LGBTQIA+ performers for a 4-week rehearsals, a 3-week London run and a 3-night run on the Isle of Wight - looking for actor-musicians for the following roles:

Role 1: Hik - They/Them

- Early/mid 20s - A struggling working class non-binary writer. Opinionated, smart, if a little lost and insecure. Exists in the - modern day narrative. Some scenes include misgendering.

- Role may involve some intimacy.
- To be played by an actor who identifies as queer/non-binary/genderqueer/genderfluid
- Any ethnicity
- Actor-Musician would be ideal comfortable with singing
- Comfortable with movement would be ideal, but not essential

Role 2: Ensemble Member ~ Multiple Roles

- Looking for an actor-musician who is a confident multi-roler, comfortable playing multiple genders and multiple ages, potentially across both timelines (1920s & 2023).

- Any ethnicity.
- Comfortable with movement and singing would be ideal, but not essential.
