

On Saturday 6th of December 18 students in year 12 represented the college in an Island wide mock trial competition. Our students competed against teams from 8 other schools playing roles like lawyers, witnesses, courts clerks, ushers and jurors. In the end CtK ended up on top with every student who took part proudly representing CtK. Competitions like this are vital in helping improve students' public speaking and analytical skills as well as providing key insights to the legal system.

The Court Competition

The day was 6th December, 2025. Both the prosecution and defence teams had been practicing for a month now, and it all lead up to this day. Our Defence team, composed of Amber Cousins and Darcey Morgan as the lawyers, Bonnie Watson as the defendant, Vlad Ignatenko as defence witness 1, and Finnan Hall as the usher, were on at 9:30 sharp. Up against the Island VI, the defence team had successfully managed to gain the verdict of not guilty. After a successful cross-examination, examination-in-chief and speech from both lawyers, it was evident that the team had prepared to the best of the abilities. While there were slight difficulties with the witnesses cross-examination, in the end, they were both able to swiftly recover and stand their ground.

Moving onto after lunch, at 2pm, the prosecution team, composed of Phoebe Arnold and Helena Szymanowska as the lawyers, Vincent Vaughan as prosecution witness 1, Melvina Namirimu as prosecution witness 2, and Anthony Fuoss as Court Clerk, were against Ryde Private. The jury had ended up coming to the verdict of not guilty, however this is not a measure of their talent, as Judge Kerry Maylin had gave them excellent feedback, highlighting their strengths. An amazing cross-examination was conducted, and it was clear that the examination-in-chief was well practiced, as well as the speeches delivered from both lawyers. The witnesses also did an excellent job in standing their ground against the opposition.

The jury, composed of Aria Melody-Bamford, Bethea Wells, Florence Wells, Hannah Buckthorpe, Kelechi Maxwell-Opete, Lyla Peach, Mariella Penn-Sampler and Rose Green, as well as the bonus members of Amber Cousins, Bonnie Watson, Anthony Fuoss, Finnan Hall and Melvina Namirimu, the jury declared the final case between Cowes and The Bay of not guilty.

Overall, all the teams had gained a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to be able to experience what it would be like to be in court. A few have come out of this with the aspirations of going into law, and others can agree that even if they don't want to go into law, that it was still a memorable experience.

Now, at 4pm, the judges gathered and tallied up the scores they had given. In 3rd place was The Bay, in 2nd was Cowes, and in **1st.. WAS CHRIST THE KING!** The team gathered and celebrated, taking a photo with the judges, which you can see below. Thank you to Mr Hare and Mr Russell, the two teachers who had given up their time to assemble a team together, as well as the organisers of the High Sheriff Court Competition!




Biomedical Sciences Visit

On Friday 7th November, Christ the King College hosted a team of research Scientists from Solent University. Whilst here, they allowed us to participate in a biomedical research programme involving blood types. We all used analytic haematology techniques to extract our own samples and determine our blood group.

Interestingly enough, in our small sample we did not have any students with the most common occurring blood type of O. As a member of the blood group type O, Mr Montrose gracefully stepped up to demonstrate his results to allow for a comparison.

We also used high powered microscopes to look at samples of cell cultures from healthy and infected examples. This allowed us to understand the difference in appearance and histology of these samples.

UKMT Senior Mathematical Challenge

On Thursday 10th October thirty seven of Christ the King's post-sixteen Mathematics students took part in the UKMT Senior Mathematical Challenge.

Two of our students, **Vincent Vaughan and Deepak Loganathan** achieved a Gold Certificate in their age group and have subsequently been invited to take part in the Andrew Jobbings Senior Kangaroo 2025 follow-on round, which will take place later this month. Only 8000 students nationally go through to this next round

This is a huge achievement for these young mathematicians. Christ the King College is extremely proud and excited for these students and to see how far they can go in the competition.

Pilgrimage to Taizé - France

27th June—5th July 2026

You have the amazing opportunity to join this pilgrimage to Taizé in France from **Saturday**

27th June – Sunday 5th July This is when all of the GCSE and A level examinations are finished. The dates do not clash with the year 11 prom, the year 13 prom or the Isle of Wight Festival.



Total cost? £325 inclusive of travel (coach and ferry), food and accommodation. The Diocese of Portsmouth are making a substantial financial gift to subsidise the costs for our young people and we are very grateful for this support.

How do I pay? 1st payment of £26 by 19 Dec. 4 payments of £74.75 end Jan, Feb, Mar & Apr.

How do I sign-up? Your parent / carer has received an email via Compass. Sign up there.

Documents needed? A passport & GHIC card by the time we travel. Plus a UK residency card if you are not a British citizen.

The January equal consideration deadline will be **Wednesday 14 January 2026**, keeping the mid-week scheduling to avoid conflicts with weekends.

UCAS is also reintroducing the end of March advisory deadline to encourage earlier decision-making.

The reject by default deadline is set for 13 May 2026.

Recent UCAS data highlights that some applicants are experiencing delays in receiving decisions. For example, by 1 April 2024, 90,000 UK 18-year-olds were still waiting for at least one decision.

In cycles where the end of March advisory deadline was previously in place, significantly fewer applications were left pending at this stage. While it's inevitable that some applicants may still face delays, we expect the adjustment to pre-pandemic norms will reduce the number affected during the critical pre-exam period.

Looking ahead, UCAS will continue to review cycle dates and deadlines, with details for the 2027 cycle to be shared no later than December 2025.

Please note, these updates apply only from the 2026 cycle; deadlines for the 2025 entry remain unchanged.

Use of AI; The Rules



Information for candidates AI (Artificial Intelligence and assessments)

What is AI?

AI stands for artificial intelligence and can be used to create text, images, videos, music and artwork based on instructions given to an AI tool.



What is an AI tool?

AI tools are applications, such as ChatGPT, Snapchat My AI, Google and Google translate. There are many more!*



*The list of certain suppliers of AI-related products is for information purposes only and does not constitute an endorsement by JCQ and awarding bodies. It is each centre's responsibility to investigate and verify any suppliers they use, including any terms and conditions which govern the sale or use of the supplier's products. The list provided is not exhaustive.

When can I use AI?



- Your teachers may use it in class when teaching the course, but remember teaching in the classroom is not an exam!
- There are some assessments where you can use AI – your teachers will tell you if you can or cannot use an AI tool.
- Remember, the rules are different for different assessments and subjects, so always check with your teachers first!
- When an AI tool is allowed, **you must acknowledge**** the AI tools and the material produced by the AI tool that you have used in your work. If you do not acknowledge AI use, it will be considered as cheating.

When can I not use an AI tool?



- AI tools cannot be used in an exam or any other assessment where exam rules apply.
- This is what exam boards call **AI misuse and is a form of cheating.**

**Acknowledgment – When producing a piece of work, if you use the same wording as a published source, you must place quotation marks around the passage and state where it came from. This is known as referencing. You must make sure that you give detailed references for everything in your work which is not in your own words, for example, ChatGPT 3.5 (<https://openai.com/blog/chatgpt/>), 25/01/2025.

IF YOU USE AN AI TOOL, YOU CANNOT GET MARKS FOR WHAT THE AI TOOL HAS PRODUCED, AS IT IS NOT YOUR OWN WORK

If I'm allowed to use AI, how is this breaking the rules?



- AI misuse is when you use an AI tool in an exam or assessment where you are not allowed to; and/or
- Where you use an AI tool to create work and then say it's your own.

How to make sure you don't misuse AI

DECLARE

- Remember to sign your declaration form when handing in your work for final assessment.
- Your signature on the declaration form tells your teacher and the exam board that you are saying all the work you're handing in is your own.
- If you have used an AI tool, **you must declare***** that you have used it before signing the declaration form!

***Declare – this means that when you submit your work for marking, the awarding body will normally require you to sign an authentication statement confirming that you have read and followed the regulations.

ACKNOWLEDGE

If you are allowed to use an AI tool in your assessment (remember to check!), you must do the following:

- reference the AI tool you have used
- give the date of when the AI tool generated the content
- give details of how you used it.
- save screenshots of what you have asked or instructed the AI tool to do and what answer the AI gave you, and include this with the work submitted.




