Borneo Expedition

News from the jungle!

Tuesday 16th July

Today was our last day at Bilit Lodge, and we finished our community work at the village school. We painted the name of the school and their slogan in black letters, and some extra information in bright colours. We



also added our handprints as signatures, so a little bit of us will remain for ever on this giant sign board in this very special place.

After lunch we had a volleyball match with the primary school teachers, as they finish their teaching by 1p.m. One of our teams won, but our 'B' team was definitely out-classed! In the evening some of the school children came over to the lodge and did some dancing for us which was lovely. At the end we were asked to join in and everyone had a great dance, followed by a karaoke session. It was a great last night.

Wednesday 17th July

Today started early, and we got to the 40km² Sepilok orangutan sanctuary in time for the feeding at 10 a.m. We enjoyed watching the orphaned orangutans in the nursery area compete with the pig-tailed macaque monkeys for the bananas, and an adult female with her baby. The baby, just like most babies, was much more interested in playing than eating and it kept us entertained with its antics. Our second trip was to a sun bear conservation centre where rescued sunbears are rehabilitated and released back into the wild. The final trip of the day was to a rainforest discovery centre skywalk, where we walked in and above the canopy of the trees. Unfortunately our BandB for the night had been double booked, so we ended up in a 4 star hotel with pool, and were sent our for an amazing Chinese meal. Everyone is getting much more adventurous with food and a lot of them students tried calamari, fish with mango sauce and vegetables with bean curd, as well ss fried chicken.

Thursday 18th July

We arrived at Camp Bongkud today after a 5 hour road trip. We settled into our longhouses and got to know the students from another group who are also staying in the camp. Our afternoon ac-



tivity was learning Malay and Dusun words and phrases, learning to sing in Malay and then to dance. The students from the two groups then settled into a great game of football followed by an evening of socialising. It is hard to believe we have been away from the UK a week already, as we have done and seen so much. The students are embracing everything really well, and they are having an amazing time.

Psychology Trips








On Thursday 3rd July 10 psychology and sociology students visited Solent University in Southampton. They had 3 sessions on Psychology (Biopsychology), sociology (sexuality and gender) and criminology (explaining criminal behaviour). They also had a tour of the campus, including their amazing sports facilities, mock nursing ward and broadcasting studios. We were all amazed of what Solent had to offer, not only state of the art technology (e.g. tremor gloves, BIOPAC, EEG equipment, life like model in a bed and 3D imagery of inside the body) but we were also surprised to hear that many of their courses offer no terminal exam style learning, which could suit many students way of learning. The staff were very welcoming and they seemed to enjoy the day.

Psychology Trips



On Wednesday the 17th of July 11 Psychology students and Miss Harland ventured over to the University of Portsmouth Psychology Department for the day on Wednesday 17th July. The day consisted of 4 different sessions.

Session 1: Myths and tricks in Psychology; where Prof Ed showed us how our mind can play tricks on us and that we shouldn't trust everything that we think we see. He demonstrated how our memory can be manipulated and crazy illusions that trick our nervous system, making things feel very surreal (phantom limb trick).

Session 2: Explaining emotions using infrared cameras. Here we discussed the fight or flight response and the physiological changes that occur in the body. He talked about his Doctorate and what happens when we cry.

Session 3: Eye tracking to find out what we really look at when we are reading or looking at images. We explored why our eyes do these saccades, which ensure that we see whole images and to stop us feeling dizzy when we move our eyes. It was interesting to find out what our eyes do when we try to pick a criminal out of a lineup of 10 people. We saw that we didn't look at all 10 but skipped to those who looked most similar to the criminal, or who we thought the criminal was.

Season 4: Progressive relaxation and vagus nerve stimulation activities. This was very beneficial, because I found the vagus nerve one very therapeutic and felt myself instantly calmed. Most of the students looked ready for a nap after this session.

We discussed careers linked to Psychology and what University life is like. The students were able to ask the professors and undergraduate students of both Psychology and Forensic Psychology questions.

We had a great day and would love to go back again next year, so watch this space.




