PARENTS GUIDE



WHO ARE WE?

We are a social mobility charity that works in rural and coastal cities making sure that geography never stands in the way of opportunity we support 18-25-year-olds into professional, city-based careers.

We provide young people with a 4-year programme of support, including, city-based work experience, networking opportunities and workplace knowledge. We aim to give every young person the proven tools and support they need to succeed.

WHAT DO WE DO?

The first 2 years of our support is the Emerging Talent Programme (ETP) aimed at 18-20-year-olds in the early stage of their higher education and career journey.

The final 2 years is our Future Talent Programme (FTP) aimed at 20 – 23 year-olds in their 2nd or final year of university looking for full-time roles.

WHAT IS THE EMERGING TALENT PROGRAMME?

This programme covers the period from leaving school through the first year of university and/or a gap year. Every July, we have a 2-week residential trip helping students get valuable work experience with market-leading companies in either London or Manchester from the 1st-12th July 2024.

During the residential students have a comprehensive timetable, during the day (10 am - 4 pm) they will be at their work placement with the evenings and weekends for networking and employability events, seminars, and workshops.

Creative Writing workshop

Selected students from Yr 7 to Yr 12 had the unique opportunity to attend a two-hour Creative Writing workshop with a university professor earlier this week. 45 students from Year 7, 8, 9, 10 and 12 spent time working alongside Professor Emily Bullock (Media Fellow and Senior Lecturer in Creative Writing at the Open University) across two sessions, learning how to create and develop characters and setting, use sensory details and how to create conflict in creative writing. Students learnt a variety of techniques through mind mapping, illustration and free writing activities. Students then had the opportunity to share their creative writing with each other and were encouraged to develop their story ideas further after the workshop.

All of the students across both sessions were really engaged and focused throughout and were a real credit to the college in all respects. Well done to all of you!



Debate Competition

Earlier in the year, we were visited by Justin Potter who gave a wide-ranging talk on the importance of confident self-expression as well as promoting the Isle of Wight Schools Debate Competition.

Fast-forward to Friday 14th July, and Christ the King College students proudly took part in the first event of its kind at Newport Minster.

The day began with speakers including Bob Seely and other activities included workshops run by various teachers, including one by our own Mr Torrington.

During the morning activities, **Arzoo Rizvi** had to 'communicate' without using words and then switch to being only allowed 4 words: yes. no, oh, well. Suffice it to say her outstanding performance proved that no one should ever get on her wrong side, regardless of the number of words she chooses to use.

Before lunch, teams from 7 schools across The Island had a busy working lunch of research and preparation for the afternoon debates.

Christ the King College was selected to go first, debating Priory School on the topic "School uniform should be optional". Teams took turns to speak, offering arguments and responding to their opponent's. Arzoo went first, which is never easy, and did a great job. After hearing from the other side, **Jaleel Mills** replied. His delivery was impactful, calm and measured. While it didn't quite convince the judges, it won him firm support from the audience. If you've ever out in Cowes and get confronted by boys about the age of 14, make sure Jaleel is with you to diffuse the situation with words of wisdom. Finally, it came to **Guillianne Ponferrada** to have the last word in the debate, summarising the whole thing but 'spinning' it in our favour. She dismantled the opposition and earned a special

award from the judges.



And while Ryde Academy walked away with the High Sherriff's Cup this year, our team showed we have what it takes to compete with the best of them. Well done and thank you to all who took part! The date is already set for next year's debate, so anyone from Year 10 or above interested in taking part - and taking that cup off of Ryde Academy - should contact Mr

Torrington or watch out for promotion nearer the time.

Enrichment Update

Philippa Daley from Action Isle of Wight (with in-depth knowledge of the situations facing **refugees**) visited this month. Her talk was so impactful it literally left me speechless. But luckily, Mrs Conway-Hughes, as well as a very well-attended audience (thank you all!), were there to ensure it all went smoothly. The audience participation was amazing, by which I mean not just the little activity of moving around the auditorium (to feel 'displaced') but the heartfelt, active listening I witnessed. You get out what you put in with something like enrichment, and the level of engagement with the speaker is something I am very proud of our Sixth Form community for. I think we all left with a deeper understanding of the realities of displacement.

Looking ahead to next week, our penultimate session will be the rescheduled 'Perspectives on Death and Dying', with a mix of in-house and external expert speakers. The greater numbers making the most of the Enrichment session really made a difference, so thank you to anyone who has encouraged this and to students who attended. The benefits of this session cannot be overstated, as the topic will handled sensitively, maturely and encourages a broad spectrum of perspectives that participants can expect to help further develop their own understanding.

Isle of Wight Open Studios

We are well aware that the Isle of Wight has a strong and growing creative community. Indeed, the research we undertook for the cultural strategy demonstrated that the island has a larger than average number of people making a living as artists and craft makers.

As part of our commitment to ensuring everyone on the island has a chance to be creative, we have spent the past year working to revive the Island's annual Open Studios event. This felt like an obvious way of sharing the extraordinary array of craft makers and artists working across the island that builds on the work of the Isle of Wight Creative Network.

ARTSWORK RISE 24

We are offering £500 in funding to 25 young creatives aged 13-30. Our RISE scheme supports young creatives in overcoming barriers to

developing their creative practice who are based in the South East and parts of the South West – view the map. Spanning the wide range of UK creative industries, the funding aims to empower and invest in the next generation of artists and creators.

Young people are invited to apply with a short video, demonstrating what their creative practice is, what they would do with the funding and how they think this micro-investment would support their aspirations and help them overcome any barriers they may have as a creative. Applicants will also be asked to supply some examples of their work and to fill in an application form.

- Deadline: 6pm, Sunday 30 June 2024
- Decisions will be made and applicants notified by no later than 19 July 2024
- A final report on how the money was used and its impact is required by 8 November 2024 from successful applicants. Guidance will be provided closer to the time on how to do this and successful completion of the report will earn you a digital badge which can be used on portfolio's or CV's to show the experience you have gained

World Environment Day

Christ the King College has a group called the "World Future Alliance" (WFA), whose mission includes anything do to with the positive legacy the current generation leaves behind, whether that is to do with the environment, practical events (beach cleans, activities in College, etc.) or responding to global issues such as migration.

Recently the WFA, now headed by Caleb Palmer in Yr. 12, responded to World Environment Day earlier this year by making a declaration about its intentions for the future, with a focus on water scarcity. WHO ARE WE?

The Young Reporter scheme is a schools programme, giving students an opportunity to write for real live online newspapers.

It is a fantastic way for you to be able to showcase your published work and build up a portfolio over the period of time that you work with us.

We believe all young people have a right to speak about what is important to them and what they are passionate about.

HOW DOES IT WORK?

The scheme is open to years 10 to 13 and runs from September through to April, with students signing up to write 8 articles during the 8 month period. You are given deadlines to work to and categories to write within and all your articles are published.

At the end of the scheme there is a competition, where you can submit 3 of your chosen articles to be judged against other students in your age group.

In June each year we run an Awards Ceremony, where the winners are then announced for that academic year. The two Top Reporters of each year group also go on to become the faces of the scheme for the following year.

WHERE DO YOU UPLOAD?

We are in partnership with Newsquest Media Group, so your work will be published on your local Newsquest online paper.



OPPORTUNITIES

Throughout the scheme you are given plenty of opportunities that you have the potential to cover.

Over the years we have sent students to various press events, such as Up at the O2, Immersive Gamebox, Monopoly Lifesize, The London Dungeon, various theatres productions, Backyard Cinema and many more.

These opportunities give you the chance to see what it is like to be a real journalist at a press night, which is a great experience.

Clearing

Clearing is a way to get a university place if a student:

- doesn't get the grades for their firm or insurance choice.
- · hasn't received any offers.
- has changed their mind and no longer wants to go to their firm choice.
- · applies after 30 June.

Clearing vacancies are displayed in the UCAS Search Tool from 5 July.



Clearing Plus

Also for students who apply after 30 June, and those not holding an offer. We use their application information to match them to suggested courses. They can see these courses by clicking the 'My matches' button in their application.



Decline my place


