

Subject Requirements



Candidates should have the skills and knowledge acquired on a GCSE Literature course or equivalent.

It is recommended that candidates should have achieved at least a grade 5 at GCSE English Language and/ or Literature; a grade 4 may be accepted after discussion with an A-Level Literature teacher.




Course Structure


There are two external examinations (each paper worth 40% of the A level):

Paper 1:

Part A: Shakespeare: Hamlet
Part B: Drama and Poetry
pre-1900: She Stoops to Conquer (Goldsmith) and The Merchants Tale (Chaucer)



Paper 2:



Part A: Close reading from The Gothic
Part B: Comparative and Contextual Study: The Bloody Chamber (Carter) and The Picture of Dorian Gray (Wilde) or Frankenstein (Shelley)

The Coursework (worth 20%):

For the Coursework Module, students will need to closely analyse chosen pages of a post-2000 text and compare two further post-1900 texts (chosen coursework texts must include a poetry collection, a drama and a prose text).
